FUNERAL OF THE LATE MISS REBECCA ALLEN.—The remains of this much-respected lady were laid to rest in the family-burying ground in Ahamplish churchyard on Sunday, the 29th ult. The deceased had reached the advanced age of ninety years, and up until within a few days of her death had enjoyed remarkably good health and great strength and vigour of mind. Her family has lived in Grange for over two hundred years, and were always held in high esteem by all their neighbours. Her father, William Allen, who died about the year 1850, left behind him six daughters and two sons, all of whom she survived. For over thirty years Miss Allen was post-mistress of Grange—a post in which she gave great satisfaction to the general public, and which she resigned about

seven years ago owing to old age. She was always a consistent member of the Church of Ireland, which received her steady and liberal support. At her funeral, which was largely attended by all creeds and classes; the chief mourners were—William and John Allen, nephews, and Charles Allen, grandnephew. The solemn and impressive service of the Church was conducted in the church and at the grave-side by the Incumbent of the Parish, the Rev J. H. M'Cormick, A.B. Captain Wm. Knilands, nephew of the deceased and one of the executors named in her will, arrived in Grange on last Saturday from the United States, and is at present engaged in winding up the affairs of her estate. It is understood by her will she bequeathed a considerable sum to the County Sligo Protestant Orphan Society, of which she was for many years a warm supporter, and also a like sum to the Diocese of
